STAGES OF THE PHOSPHORUS CYCLE

MECHANICAL WEATHERING, CHEMICAL DISSOLUTION, AND EROSION CONTRIBUTE TO MAKING PHOSPHORUS ACCESSIBLE FOR BIOLOGICAL UPTAKE.

Absorption by Plants and Microorganisms

Plants absorb phosphate ions from the soil through their roots. Phosphorus is incorporated into organic molecules within plants, supporting growth and development. Soil microorganisms also play a role by mineralizing organic phosphorus compounds, converting them into inorganic forms that plants can readily use. This biological uptake is critical for transferring phosphorus into food webs.

Consumption and Incorporation into Food Webs

Animals obtain phosphorus by consuming plants or other organisms. Phosphorus is essential for skeletal structure in vertebrates, as well as cellular energy processes. Sedimentation and Geological Uplift

Phosphorus can also accumulate in aquatic sediments, especially in lakes and oceans, where it may become part of sedimentary rock formations. Over geological timescales, tectonic activity can uplift these rocks, restarting the cycle by exposing phosphorus to weathering processes. This stage illustrates the slow, long-term nature of the phosphorus cycle compared to other nutrient cycles.

CONTRIBUTION TO SOIL FERTILITY

PHOSPHORUS CONTRIBUTES TO SOIL FERTILITY BY SUPPORTING MICROBIAL ACTIVITY AND NUTRIENT CYCLING. IT INTERACTS WITH OTHER NUTRIENTS SUCH AS NITROGEN AND POTASSIUM TO PROMOTE HEALTHY PLANT GROWTH. HUMAN IMPACTS ON THE PHOSPHORUS CYCLE

PHOSPHORUS MINING AND RESOURCE DEPLETION
